**ABOUT THIS WEEK'S MUSIC:** Alexandre Guilmant (1837-1922) was one of the great French organists of the 19th-early 20th centuries. French organ music had fallen into a period of decay, with the exception of the music of César Franck (1822-1890). There were two great organist/composers who helped improve the art of organ playing in France--Guilmant and Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937.) They based their style on studying the music of Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) but the style they created was quite different, for a more modern type of instrument, and using more modern techniques. Guilmant was extremely popular in the United States, and his music was played often by American organists up til at least the middle of the 20th century. In fact, because of his popularity in the United States, it is extremely likely that pieces like those heard this morning would have been played at College Hill when the church was new. He visited the United States three times for concert tours, and his remarks and observations had a deep influence on both American organ playing and the design of organs.

The writer of the text of today's opening hymn (#17--Sing Praise to God, You Heavens!) was Rev. Herman G. Stuempfle, Jr. (1923-2007). Stuempfle was a graduate of Susquehanna University and Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg. He later became the President of the Gettysburg seminary. He is known as one of the most respected hymn text writers of the 20th and early 21st centuries, and his hymn texts are found in many modern hymn collections. His text for our opening hymn is paired in our hymnal with a tune that was originally a German love song celebrating the joys of spring. Stuempfle's nephew, Michael Stuempfle (1950-2023), was a tenor, and Thomas Dressler worked with him at the church of St. John the Evangelist in Lambertville, New Jersey, during the 1990s.
